There are important actions that children and young people, their parents and those who work with them can take to help prevent further spread of the virus.

In all education, childcare and social care settings, preventing the spread of coronavirus involves dealing with direct transmission (for instance, when in close contact with those sneezing and coughing) and indirect transmission (via touching contaminated surfaces). A range of approaches and actions will continue to be implemented to do this.. These can be seen as a hierarchy of controls that, when implemented, creates an inherently safer system, where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced. These include:

- A requirement that people who are ill with covid 19 symptoms stay at home
- Robust hand and respiratory hygiene
- Enhanced cleaning arrangements
- Protocols to deal with an outbreak of Covid-19 in school

			<p>Update 14th Dec 2021</p> <p>Close contacts of anyone testing positive for covid should take lateral flow tests for 7 days rather than isolating. That includes people aged 5 -18 and adults who are double vaccinated.</p>		
	<p><b>Positive test result</b></p> <p>Infection control -increased transmission</p>	<p>Staff Pupils</p>	<p>If a member of staff or pupil tests positive for Covid 19 they should isolate immediately and book a confirmatory PCR test.</p> <p>If the PCR test is negative, within 2 days of the LFD test, they may return to work/school and stop isolating.</p> <p>If the PCR test is positive they should isolate for 10 days from the start of symptoms and contact tracing will be used to inform close contacts.</p> <p>Pupils displaying Covid symptoms in school should be isolated in the medical room and parents/carers contacted to collect them to be tested.</p> <p>From 16th August 2021 children aged 18 and under will no longer be required to routinely isolate. Those in close contact will be required to book a PCR test. 	Increased transmission of Covid 19		<p>In case of an outbreak we will contact the DFE for support and guidance.  It may be necessary to step up control measures to ensure the safety of everyone. Measures taken will be kept to a minimum but may include all or some of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Creating a bubble for the affected Year group to reduce transmission. This may mean separate breaks/lunches, play areas, assemblies.</li> <li>● Encouraging adults within the affected bubble to wear face coverings when in close contact.</li> <li>● Enhanced cleaning regime</li> <li>●</li> </ul>	PPA available - face coverings, gloves, aprons
