Our Year 6 Remembrance day, a Day to Remember.

After our assembly, two people from Kent Libraries came to talk to us about Great Chart Village history during the Second World War. They gave us each a letter and in groups of four we discussed what qualities the letter held. Each letter had been sent to the Friends of Great Chart, which was founded by Elizabeth Strout. As well as this, they showed us pictures of the soldiers that wrote the letters who lived in the village. As a class, we discussed how their lives had changed since the war had started. We found out that before the war, all the men were desperate for adventure and when news came out that England needed soldiers, they took up the chance, a once in a lifetime opportunity. She often received letters but sometimes, as a treat, Elizabeth sent them small gifts that included: musical instruments, cake and other surprises. Although Elizabeth sent the soldiers gifts, the soldiers from Great Chart sent her gifts such as jumpers and mud sculptures. Altogether, we really enjoyed this part of the day, and before they left, we said a great big thank you to them.

After our lesson break, we got the chance to venture up to the war memorial, nearby the church, in the village. In pairs, we took a moment to admire all the cottages the old soldiers of Great Chart lived in. On our walk up to the memorial, we managed to get a good view of the old school, it was where the old Great Chart School was. Once we had reached the memorial, we gathered round it and looked at the names carved onto the stone. We looked at the boards at the side of the memorial because they had information on the soldiers and when they died. We found out that soldiers sadly died on Christmas Eve, they apparently died of wounds. When we went round the memorial, Mrs Carter asked us to find brothers; after a while we found a couple of pairs of brothers but never in the same force. We laid a poppy wreath and said a poem for the soldiers. After all of this, we participated in the 2 minute silence.

The whole day was a great experience and we will remember it even once we have left Great Chart Primary School. It was so interesting, learning about all the soldiers who left their village to go and fight for their country.
